What is the Edmonton Garrison MFRC?

The Edmonton Garrison Military Family Resource Centre (MFRC) is a non-profit, charitable organization. The MFRC fosters and supports individual, family and community well-being by providing services and support that address the uniqueness of our military families.

The MFRC is governed by a volunteer Board of Directors of which 51% must be a civilian spouse of full-time service Canadian Forces (CF) members.

Programs and Services

The MFRC provides programs and services that fall into the following four categories.

- Personal Development and Community Integration
- Child/Youth Development and Parenting Support
- Family Separation and Reunion
- Prevention, Support and Intervention

Personal Development and Community Integration

Mobility is an inherent part of the military lifestyle. Therefore, the MFRC helps military families integrate into their new community, enhances quality of life and promotes and supports personal, family and community development.

Child/Youth Development and Parenting Support

Positive parenting and support for the care and development of children and youth contribute to the health and well-being of families and communities. The MFRC supports parents in their care-giving role and provides opportunities for healthy development of children and youth

Family Separation and Reunion

The operation and training requirements of the Canadian Forces (CF) often result in the absence of the CF member from his/her family. The MFRC provides information, outreach and support to these families.

Prevention, Support and Intervention

Individual and family well-being has a significant impact on military readiness. The emphasis of the MFRC is to strengthen the existing capacity of individuals and families through primary preventative services.

Deployment Support

The MFRC deployment program provides resources, programs, and support to CF families prior to, during and after a deployment.

A deployment means the assignment of military personnel on unaccompanied duty away from their normal Garrison/Base for a period of more than four weeks. Examples of this would be temporary duty, extended course, unaccompanied posting or overseas missions.

Services provided by the MFRC deployment service include:

- Resources and up-to-date mission information
- Assistance during family-related emergencies
- Drop-in centre for families Garrison Family Support Coordination Centre (GFSCC)
- Mail drop-off for overseas delivery
- Special events and activities for adults and families
- Deployment related publications for adults and children
- Dedicated website www.gfscc.com
- Liaise regularly with unit family support sections
- Family briefings
- Reunification briefings
- Regular informal social gatherings
- Deployment related workshops
- Social events
- Deployment child care
- Warmline phone service (for family members of personnel deployed two months and longer).



Resources - Publications for Adults

The MFRC has a wide variety of deployment related publications for adults. Available in English and French.

Family Handbook

The Family Handbook includes information for families of deployed CF members. Material includes resource information, check lists, family communications information, guides on health & well-being, and information on benefits and allowances.

Preparing for Deployment Stress

This booklet offers general suggestions for some of the common reactions faced through the different phases of deployment — pre-deployment, during deployment and post- deployment. It offers suggestions for both the departing CF member and the spouse who is staying.

Preparing for Critical Incident Stress

This handbook offers assistance in recognizing, accepting and dealing with Critical Incident Stress. Critical Incident Stress is a normal reaction to an abnormal event which is sudden and unexpected, disrupts one's sense of control, involves the perception of a life threat, and may include elements of physical or emotional loss.

Preparing for Reunion Stress

This handbook offers assistance for military families reunited after unaccompanied tours of duty. Reunion stress refers to the physical and emotional demands experienced by family members around the time of homecoming.

Member Assistance Program

This publication provides information on the Members Assistance Program. The Members Assistance Program offers qualified and confidential support to assist you in overcoming almost every problem that can affect your professional or personal life.

Resources - Publications for Children & Youth

The MFRC has a wide variety of deployment related publications for children and youth. The purpose of these books is to bring some comfort to the children of deployed members while their parent is deployed.

The Mission Information Line is a toll free, bilingual telephone service for families of Canadian military personnel serving an operation role outside of Canada.

- Timely and accurate information
- Reassurance and support
- Referral to other resources when required.
- Information access 24 hours a day
- Line Personnel available from 6:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Edmonton time.

Additional Family Support

Several agencies work hand-in-hand with the MFRC to help provide advice and support to the families of deployed members.

Family Support Sections

Many units at Edmonton Garrison have internal Family Support Section (FSS). They provide families with an additional, local point of contact and source of support. The MFRC works in close collaboration with the Unit FSS as a Family Support Team to coordinate and provide deployment support programs for families.

Garrison Social Work Office

The Garrison Social Work Office (GSWO) is comprised of military and civilian social workers well versed in the unique lifestyle of the military family. The staff is available to assist with individual, marital and family counseling. Other preventative services are also offered. Sometime just being able to talk about your concerns can help you overcome, or at least reduce the feeling of being overwhelmed by the demands of the military lifestyle. You can contact the GSWO by calling the Garrison Operator at 973-4011.

Chaplains

The military Chaplains are well versed in the issues facing the families of our military members. Both the Roman Catholic (RC) and Protestant Chaplains are located in Lancaster Park. Many of the Units have their own Chaplains. You can contact the unit FSS to find out this information. During silent hours, a "duty chaplain" is always available to look after emergency situations. You can contact Pastoral care 24 hrs a day by calling the Garrison Operator at 973-4011.



Member Assistance Program (MAP)

The Member Assistance Program (MAP) is a voluntary and confidential service, initiated by the Canadian Forces (CF) to help members and family members who have personal concerns that affect their personal well being Some of the problems that the MAP may provide assistance include:

- Marital & family problems
- Work-related problems
- Emotional problems
- Psychological problems
- Substance abuse

- Financial difficulties
- Interpersonal conflicts
- Legal difficulties
- Gambling problems

Any individual wishing to talk to a professional counselor or to make an appointment can simply call the Member Assistance Program, 24 hours a day, and 365 days a year.

The Canadian Forces (CF) pays for the cost of the program. If you need specialized or longer-term help, your counselor will refer you to an appropriate professional resource.

The Member Assistance Program is confidential. Professional counselors are bound by their code of ethics to guarantee confidentiality.

2. If you are unable to contact the FSS directly, immediately call the unit Duty Centre. Advise them that you have a family emergency, and need to speak with a member of the FSS. Leave a telephone number where you can be reached. The Duty Centre staff will initiate a call on your behalf, and you should receive a telephone call back as soon as possible.

3. If you are unable to contact the parent unit FSS or duty centre, or if you are unsure of who to call, call the Deployment Support Coordinator at 973-4011 ext 5080

After hours, call 973-4011 and ask for the Garrison Duty Centre;.

Advise them that you must speak with a member of the **EDMONTON GARRISON FAMILY DEPLOYMENT SUPPORT COORDINATION CENTRE** immediately, and leave a telephone number where you can be reached. The Duty Staff will contact the GFSCC on your behalf, and you will receive a telephone call from the GFSCC as soon as possible. The GFSCC will do whatever it can to assist in an emergency.

The MFRC Emergency Child Care Service supports the ability of CF members to be available for all types of duty by ensuring parents have access to child care in emergency situations. This is conducted by assisting families in the development of a family care plan, providing referrals to alternate full

In specific circumstances the Emergency Child Care Service may provide up to 72 hours of financial support for families during an emergency by paying for childcare.

Emergencies do not including recurring events during the course of a year. Such circumstances should be addressed in the family care plan. Emergency situations are expected to be resolved within a 24 – 72 hour period and are considered situations that are not foreseeable.

Examples of emergencies that would clarify for this service are:

- When the CF member is away on duty and the spouse/caregiver is unavailable due to illness.
- When the CF member is away on duty and the spouse/caregiver is unavailable due to a family emergency.
- When a single parent or both parents are CF members and CF duty requirements are such that the regular child care provider is unavailable.
- When a child is ill and the parent is unable to access their usual child care arrangement at a time when the CF member's presence at work is critical to the militarily operation.

Deployment Childcare

Located in the MFRC (Building 161)

- Free for families of military members deployed for more than four weeks.
- For children from age birth to 12 years
- Supervised by experienced childcare providers in an environment appropriate to the child's age and developmental stage.
- · Games, art activities, singing, stories, outdoor play.
- School-aged children can enjoy video games, foosball, large screen TV and other activities at "The Edge" Youth & Teen Centre at the MFRC.
- Peanut/nut-free snacks and/or lunches and juice must be provided by parents.
- Families can book for more than one session at a time, but no earlier than two weeks in advance.
- Families will be asked to fill in a form prior to their first deployment child care.
- Pre-registration for deployment childcare sessions is required. Enrollment is limited and based on a first-registered basis. The registration for each session closes at least two business days before the scheduled date.
- Please make sure your child has appropriate indoor shoes and appropriate outdoor clothing and footwear. Please provide a change of clothes for young children.

Mail Information

Free Mail Service - Edmonton Garrison

Military family members can send "care packages" to loved ones overseas. The service may be used by CF personnel, their families, DND or other Federal Government employees (includes RCMP and CFPSA). Civilian contractors are not entitled to use this service.

Please refer to the MFSP Family Handbook for Military Operations pg 26 for general information on sending mail overseas.

The free mail service should not be used if the member is due to return to Canada within **four** weeks of mailing date.

Items cannot be traced using this service and delivery times are varied and not guaranteed. If you require these service, you may wish to use Canada Post for quicker delivery.

No Charitable donations and/or humanitarian aid is permitted to be sent through this service (in accordance with policy issued by the VCDS).

Mail Information (Continued)

Guidelines:

- Maximum Weight: 20 kg or 44 lb
- Size: Maximum length may not exceed 1 m
- Overall maximum dimensions not to exceed 2 m
- Oversize or overweight parcels will not be accepted.
- Parcels must be properly addressed to members, which includes their unit
- Senders must place their return address in top left corner, along with their home phone number
- All parcels must have a detailed list of the contents on the front bottom left corner of parcel.
- Letters may also be mailed.
- All parcels are x-rayed at CFPU Trenton before dispatch overseas and subject to inspection by host country.

Prohibited Items

Canada Post guidelines regarding prohibited items to host country will be followed. The following are prohibited items for mailing:

- Articles which may generally be viewed as obscene. (pornography)
- Compressed gases (certain aerosols)
- Corrosive liquids/solids (bleach, acids, certain batteries)
- Flammable liquids/solids (flints, lighter fluid, perfumes)
- Explosives (fireworks)
- Alcoholic products (wine, beer, spirits)
- Tobacco Products (cigarettes, cigars)
- Drugs and narcotics (includes prescription drugs)
- Perishable items
- Weapons, firearms or anything resembling a weapon are not permitted to be mailed. This includes replicas.

<u>Administrative and Financial Support for Deployed Members</u>

Ops Unit Record Support (URS).

When a service member is deployed overseas, a Unit Records Section (URS) is designated in Canada to hold all of the member's military records for the duration of the tour.

The URS is responsible to provide administrative and financial support to personnel deployed on operations.

The typical functions provided by a URS during a tour include ensuring that the member's pay is correct, that arrangements for leave (including reimbursement of funds) are made, and that information regarding the member's family address and/or Next of Kin is correct and current.

It is important to understand that while the MFRC can act as a local point of contact for assistance in dealing with administrative problems, the URS is the only agency that can take the physical action necessary to resolve it.

Remember that you will need an approved power of attorney form to access your partner's pay while they are overseas.

You can contact your FSS or Deployment Support Coordinator to set up a meeting with Ops URS.
